Shabbat comes every week. It starts with candle lighting at sundown on Friday and ends on Saturday night with Havdallah.



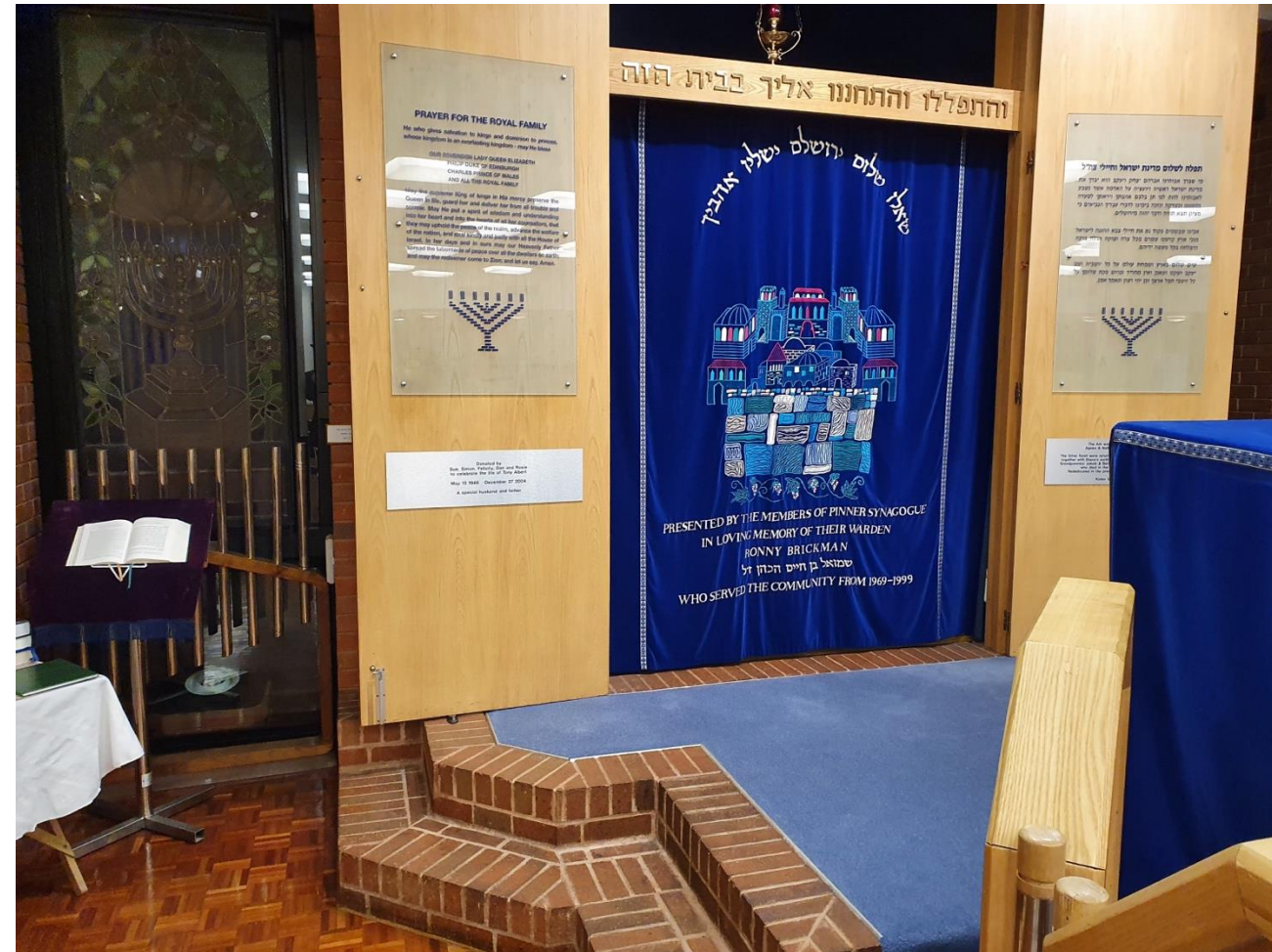
Shabbat is a very special day.

Shabbat Services take place in the shul's sanctuary. It is here that we find the Aron Kodesh, which is home to the shul's Sifrei Torah. A Torah is a scroll written in Hebrew, that we read on Shabbat.

and children join the
Chazzan on the bima
to help lead services.

Men and Women sit separately in our shul, but there are enough siddurim and chairs for everyone.
